## This Week's Math & Social Studies Standards / Test Dates

In Math the students will complete Topic 12: Adding and Subtracting Fractions and Mixed Numbers with Like Denominators. When adding or subtracting fractions with "like" (the same) denominators, simply leave the denominators alone, and add or subtract the numerators. For example, 3/12 + 8/12 = 11/12. The Topic 12 test will be Tuesday.

In Social Studies, your child will begin Chapter 7: Transportation and Communication. In Chapter 7, the kids will learn specifically about improvements in communication and transportation, such as the Overland Mail Service, the Pony Express, the telegraph, and the transcontinental railroad. We will also discuss how California became an agricultural power during the late 1800's, as farmers practiced new farming methods, planted different crops, and utilized a faster means of transportation to compete in the national and international markets.
